Papal Curiosities

How much mail does the Vatican get per day?

About 800 pounds of mail- or the equivalent of 25 bags-move into the State of Vatican City every day. Nearly twice as much, however, leaves the Vatican City daily, mostly from tourists sending somebody a letter or card from one of the four mailboxes of the city-state.

What is the reputation of Vatican Radio?

There is favourite story that gets told in Rome every now and then about the time that one of the Kremlin aides went into Leonid Brezhnev's office with needle and thread in hand to sew on the top button of Brezhnev's trousers. Totally surprised, the

Soviet chief asked how the aide knew about the missing button, to which the aide replied: "I just heard it on Vatican Radio."

All humour aside, the anecdote points out the worldwide reputation Vatican Radio has earned for itself in its more than a half century of operation. Broadcasting 225 hours a week by FM, shortwave and mediumwave, Vatican Radio has a listenership of some 80 million people.

Are there any supermarkets in Vatican City?

Vatican City has one supermarket, but no one may enter or buy anything unless he or she can produce an identification card. Prices are usually lower than in the rest of Rome and Italy, especially on alcohol which carries no custom tax. Half the shoppers in the market are laypeople whose families are historically close to the church. The remainder of the shoppers are the clerics-who are permitted to nudge their way up the line to the cash register without having to wait their turn.

What was Bernini's ambition for the design of St. Peter's?

Bernini wanted to convey the idea that St. Peter's and Catholicism were embracing any and all who come. His idea was to depict the dome of Michelangelo as St. Peter's head and two semicircles of colonnades as outstretched arms that were gathering the faithful while they moved toward the basilica. Made up of 284 Tuscan pillars and 88 pilasters, the Bernini colonnades took from 1656 to 1667 to be completed. The 140 statues of saints above the columns were carved by Bernini's students, and each one of the works received his personal attention.
