Easter Sunday Mass – 10.30am – St Francis' School Hall



From the Archives

Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week, the most important and holiest week in the Christian calendar, ending with the glorious resurrection of Christ on Easter Sunday.

On the first Palm Sunday, in about the year 33 A.D., the holy city of Jerusalem, and the roads leading into it, would have been crowded with pilgrims who had come for the annual Passover celebration. Jesus' journey into Jerusalem was by no means uneventful. He had spent many months travelling through the towns and villages of Palestine, teaching those he met and healing the sick wherever he went. The journey to Jerusalem from the Sea of Galilee would have taken him down the Jordan valley to the village oasis of Jericho where, amongst the crowds he met Zacchaeus, a wealthy Jewish public official who collected taxes on behalf of the Roman government. Famously, Zacchaeus climbed a sycamore fig tree to call out to Jesus and invite him to stay at his house over-night.

As Jesus continued his journey into Jerusalem, he told two of His disciples to go into a nearby village and bring a donkey that would be waiting there. He then rode on the donkey for the final stretch into Jerusalem. Crowds of people spread their coats on the ground in front of Him. Some waved branches of palm trees, a sign of victory. The people shouted, Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord, the King of Israel! Only a king would be greeted this way and the people wanted Jesus to be their king. Mingling with the crowd were groups of pharisees who resented the attention Jesus was being given. However, most of the people did not understand what kind of king Jesus would be. They expected their Messiah to be a great political and military leader who would free them from the tyranny of the Roman Empire. But God's Kingdom is not of this world, it is a spiritual kingdom that is now growing in the hearts of people who put their faith and trust in God.

Jesus eventually entered the crowded city through the eastern gate and made his way to the Temple Courts where, much to the annoyance of the Pharisees, he expelled a group of money changers and merchants accusing them of turning the Temple into "a den of thieves". Jesus then immediately left the city and went to the Mount of Olives where he would eventually weep over the city, 'I wish even today that you will find the way of peace. However, now it is too late, and peace is hidden from you.' (Luke 19:41-44) Sadly, Jerusalem today is still very much a divided city and the State of Israel is at war with many of its neighbours.

Please Pray for Peace in the Holy Land.
