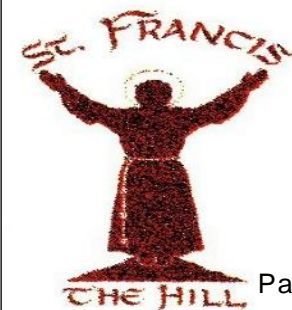

From the Archives

Last week marked the 433rd anniversary of the martyrdom of Blessed George Beesley, who was born in 1562 in the house which is now our presbytery. George lived at a time when Catholic worship was forbidden by the state and, to be identified and arrested as a priest, meant almost certain execution. Regardless of these horrendous restrictions, the catholic families of Lancashire were determined to continue to practice their faith and to attend mass whenever a priest was in the area.

In the 17th century the pack horse trails which crossed the Lancashire fells, were widely used by undercover priests as these were not

monitored by local officials seeking to capture them. The travelling priest often adopted the disguise of a pedlar, selling ribbons, threads, and pins, arriving at the back door of Catholic houses, awaiting the invitation to enter the house safely and celebrate the much-needed sacraments. The rural areas around Preston remained particularly Catholic and a number of local country estates including Samlesbury Hall and Myerscough Hall, were owned by strong Catholic families.

In 1886, by which time Salmesbury Hall had passed out of Catholic hands, a pony skin covered trunk, which had been walled up in the Southworth family home, was discovered during building work at the hall. The trunk contained several silk vestments and a travelling mass kit used by priests, including St John Southworth and St Edmund Arrowsmith, working on the Lancashire mission during the 16th and 17th century. Unfortunately, the family did not recognise the Catholic origins of the trunk and put it up for auction as 'fancy dress'. However, the significance of the trunk, was recognised by the Catholic Myerscough family who bought the lot and established it as a shrine at Myerscough. In the early 20th century John Myerscough joined the Jesuit Order and donated the trunk and its contents to Stonyhurst College. As a young boy John was employed to show visitors around the shrine, and he later claimed that this experience had been instrumental in his vocation as a priest.

The vestments, of French dress material, were probably made by the ladies of the Southworth family. This was the usual means of making vestments at the time by women who would either order dress material from abroad or would turn their own best dresses into vestments. Many of the original Catholic vestments were destroyed or turned into wall tapestries during the reformation.

The Salmesbury vestments are still owned by Stonyhurst College and are very similar in age and style to the two Hill Chapel chasubles displayed in the college museum.
