## **Pilgrimage to St Mary's Cleator CA23 3AB Sunday September 7<sup>th</sup>.**

The Pilgrimage is held every year and In this centenary year of the Diocese of Lancaster, the Diocesan Pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes will be a significant one.

The communities of Cleator and Cleator Moor were dependent on the mining and iron industries, and during the Great Depression of the 1920s and 1930s, times were very difficult for many. Fr. Clayton (priest in Cleator from 1904 to 1954) placed an appeal in the national Catholic press, and generous support was received from around the country. To provide employment for some of the parishioners Fr. Clayton bought some land adjoining the church's site and asked for volunteers to help construct a replica of the Grotto at Lourdes. These volunteers were rewarded with vouchers for food and clothing. The Grotto was opened on the 30th October 1927, and rapidly became a focus for pilgrimage from all parts of the diocese.

The theme for the Pilgrimage this year is 'Mary, Mother of the Church. People are asked to meet outside St Mary's Church in Cleator at 2.40pm and (weather permitting) process to the Grotto. The bishop will say mass there at 3.pm and bless the sick. Tea and coffee will be provided.

## **Papal Curiosities**

### **How did sixteenth century sailor earn a papal reward?**

The great Egyptian obelisk-which is one of Rome's landmarks, although it stands neither in Rome nor in Italy but just about ten yards over the Italian border-is entirely surrounded by the State of Vatican City. Back in 1586, when the obelisk was being drawn into St. Peter's Square by hundreds of horses and thousands of workers struggling

with beams, ropes, and scaffolding, the death penalty was ordered for any spectator who uttered even one word. No noise should distract the lifting of the unwieldy 75-foot giant! Soon the friction began to burn the ropes, and it was certain that the obelisk would eventually fall. Suddenly a sailor, aware of what was happening and expert as to what needed to be done, disobeyed the order of silence at the risk of his life, shouting, "Throw water on the ropes! Throw water on the ropes!" This was immediately done, and the workers finished the job without a mishap. As for the sailor, instead of being executed, he earned a papal reward-the right to supply St. Peter's Basilica with palms on Palm Sunday. His heirs still have the concession today.

### **Which century had the greatest number of popes?**

The most popes ever to be crowned during the course of a single hundred-year stretch was between the years 867 and 965, when a total of 28 popes came into being.

### **What happens to the thousands of gifts the pope receives from admirers?**

Except for art objects, which go into one of the Vatican museums, nearly all the gifts are distributed to families of limited economic means.
