From the Archives

His Holiness Pope Francis R.I.P.

17 December 1936 – 21 April 2025

I write this article on Easter Monday having just heard the very sad news of the death of The Holy Father, Pope Francis, earlier today. He was the first pope to choose the name Francis, the patron saint of our own parish of St Francis of Assisi. Like St Francis, Pope Francis was a humble man who cared passionately for the environment, for the poor and for those forced to leave their homes and community as result of political oppression and war. He was a strong critic of unbridled capitalism, consumerism and of overdevelopment. Pope Francis regularly celebrated Maundy Thursday mass by washing the feet of prisoners, patients in hospitals, residents in retirement homes and those living in the slums around Rome. He became pope on the 13th March 2013 and was the first pope from the Society of Jesus (the Jesuit Order). He was also the first from the Americas and the Southern Hemisphere and the first from outside Europe since the

eighteenth century. As Jorge Mario Bergoglio, Pope Francis was born in Buenos Aires, Argentina and was ordained as a Jesuit priest in 1969, the archbishop of Buenos Aires in 1997 and was created a cardinal by Pope John Paul II in 2001.

During the period 1974 to 1983, Argentina suffered a period of state terrorism when the military junta and security forces, in the form of so called 'death squads', hunted down political dissidents and anyone believed to be associated with socialism or left-wing politics. Between 22,000 and 30,000 people were killed or disappeared. It was recently revealed that during this period as cardinal, Pope Francis, made efforts behind the scenes to help evacuate and save the lives of over 1,000 suspected dissidents. All this at significant risk to his own life and the Argentinian Jesuit community, which he led at that time.

The pope's death now begins a 'papal interregnum' and a nine-day period of mourning known as the 'novemdiales' – Latin for nine days. The pope's funeral, by tradition, will take place within four to six days of his death. His wish was to be buried not at the Vatican but at the Basilica of Santa Maria Maggiore, situated in one of the deprived areas of Rome. Following his funeral, cardinals from all over the world will attend the general congregation of cardinals to decide the date and time of the upcoming conclave to elect a new pope.

As a tribute to Pope Francis, I end with a passage from St Matthew's gospel which I feel sums up the life he led.

'For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, when I needed clothes you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.'

'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'

May He Rest in Peace and Rise in Glory.
