From the Archives

This Sunday we welcome the Longridge Catenians to our 10.30 mass together with their wives and the wives of past members.

The Catenian Association is a network of Catholic men who meet regularly to enjoy each other's company and to help and support each other both at home and abroad. The broad aim of the association is to promote faith, family and fun amongst its members. Nine of our Hill Chapel regular worshippers, together with a number of Catenian ladies are members of the Association. Membership is open to all Catholic men and their wives and families. The name Catenian derives from Catena, the Latin word for Chain. Each member is seen as a link upon which the strength of the whole chain depends.

The Association offers support to members and their families, as needs arise, through the Catenian Benevolent and Children's Fund. The Bursary fund offers financial grants to young adults undertaking voluntary work abroad and to those wishing to work as helpers on Lourdes pilgrimages. Support is also offered to our clergy and to encourage and support vocations to the religious life. The Longridge Circle recently donated £500 to the Langridge Food Bank.

The Catenians were established in Manchester in 1908 at the behest of Louis Casartelli, the then Bishop of Salford. For the first two years the Catenians were known as "The Chums Benevolent Association", and its original and essential characteristics were typical of many male societies established in the period before the First World War. Bishop Casartelli was one of several Bishops who were anxious to see Catholic communities break the bonds of restricted education, low social status, and the limited political power and influence they had in the U.K. at that time. They acknowledged that the Chums, and later the Catenians, were a force for good and a vehicle for action. The Association spread rapidly across the UK but did not become established offshore for almost 50 years.

However, overseas growth in recent years has been rapid. There are now some 10,000 members in Africa, Australia, Bangladesh, India, Ireland, Malta and The Holy Land, as well as the UK.

The Longridge Catenians meet on the second Tuesday of the month at the Cross Keys in Inglewhite. Circle meetings are followed by a meal to which ladies and friends are invited. Throughout the year a number of social events are organised including theatre visits, golf and bowls competitions and visits to other circles. The Longridge Catenian walking group meet each month for a three-to-four-mile leisurely walk followed by a meal in a local pub/restaurant. A newly established 'E' cycling group will now meet regularly for rides around the beautiful Lancashire countryside.
